Student Achievement

In an exit survey of 39 MSCRP graduates in fall of 2023, 18 responded to the survey (46%). 100% of those surveyed indicated they were somewhat or well prepared by the CRP curriculum to communicate orally and in written form, to analyze and interpret data, to perform independently on self-directed projects, to critically analyze information and arguments, to collaborate in team work, and to evaluate the social and economic context for plans. 99% of them indicated they were somewhat or well prepared to use computer-based technology and planning-related software and to function in culturally and ethnically diverse environments.

In 2022-23, all external reviewers rated the overall quality of student work presented in final reviews in Practicum courses to be either "good" or "excellent". Our program requirements, external reviews, graduation rate, and the employment record of recent graduates in planning and related professions all indicate that the CRP program fosters the highest levels of achievement from our students.
